Summary Example: How to Write a Basic Theological Summary

A theological summary is one type of an expository essay. An expository essay is termed as an exposition, with the purpose of informing, describing and explaining something. Since the theological summary is an expository essay, the summary serves the same function. The intent of this overview is to review the elements of a basic theological summary in relation to exposition, focusing on the summary's meaning, process and characteristics. A theological summary can be defined as a synopsis of a written or verbal biblical source -- Scripture, ancient documents, commentaries, research, writings, videos, podcasts, interviews, etc. When a writer crafts a theological summary, he or she condenses key concepts, most often in his or her own words, from a biblical source to produce a concise synopsis. Thus, condensed writing is a trait of theological summary. Although characterized by condensed writing, another aspect of a theological summary is length variation. The summary's purpose determines and influences length. Yet, another feature of a theological summary is objectivity. Since the writer seeks to present objective information, he or she reports and synthesizes when summarizing, rather than interprets, evaluates or analyzes during the process. The last characteristic of a theological summary is usage of third-person point of view. For the fact that summary writing is an objective explanation, the writer views the subject from the perspective of an outsider in a non-personalized manner. To keep writing objective and non personalized, the author avoids the use of *I*, me, my or myself when summarizing. In concluding this discussion, a theological summary expositions, or explains, a biblical subject. Through the process of exposition, the writer objectively informs the reader with a condensed and objective synopsis.
