Instructional Overview

Big Ideas:

- Greatness in leadership results from relying on God living out His ways for blessings of spiritual prosperity.
- The Sermon on the Mount guides community-forming activity for lifestyle witness as salt and light to the world.
- Within the Sermon on the Mount, the Beatitudes inform the character of the Christ community of disciples and run contrary the values and ethics of a secular society.

Essential Questions

- What is the relationship between wearing the identity of Christ and Christian ethics as a pastoral servant leader?
- How do love, perfection, and obedience relate to the Beatitude character traits for pastoral leaders in their vertical and horizontal relationships?
- How do the seven pillars of servant of the Lord relate to your identity in Christ according to the Beatitudes (as pastoral leaders)?

Learning Outcomes

- Self-assesses and interprets scriptural traits of pastoral leadership through individual and group reflections.
- Reflects and gives critical insight on the spiritual gifts and ministry of all believers in relation to the pillars.

Review of the Seven Pillars & Spiritual Gifts and Ministry of all Believers

Activity 1

Three-Minute, Tag-Team Preaching

Pillar One. A servant of the Lord belongs to God through covenant.

Pillar Two. A servant of the Lord submits to His commission.

Pillar Three. A servant of the Lord places the future in His hands.

Pillar Four. A servant of the Lord follows God in faith.

Pillar Five. A servant of the Lord speaks gentle truth.

Pillar Six. A servant of the Lord trusts God.

Pillar Seven. A servant of the Lord prevails with His commission.

Directions:

- You will participate in three-minute, tag-team preaching by
 - o Picking up where the person ahead of you left off in his or her sermon
 - Relating it to the pillar to the one assigned to you during session one
 - Addressing covenant and reconciliation (vertical and horizontal) from session two
 - Connecting it to the ministry in a diverse congregation
- The goal of tag team preaching is to create one cohesive and coherent sermon comprised of several individual sermonettes, each of which picks up where the preceding ends. Speak concisely, without bird walking.
- The first person launches the subject, while each subsequent will pick up where the other left off preaching. Be ready to go up immediately after the person ahead of you finishes for a smooth transition. You may bring notes with you, but try not to read from them.

Appendix 1

Examples from Activity 3

Poor

Initial Definition

A believer in Christ with a humble and contrite spirit

Context Study: Poor (Matt 5:3)

- Humble (2 Chron 7:14; 33:12, 19; 34: 26-28; Prov 16:19; 29:23; Jas 1:9-10; 3:3; 4:9);
- Repent (Job 42:5-6); Retracting one's words and loathing or hating oneself for your sins in heart and life
- <u>Inquire of the Lord</u> (2 Chron 34:26-28); Verse 27 is the key,

Because your heart was tender and you humbled yourself before God when you heard His words against this place and against its inhabitants, and because you humbled yourself before Me, tore your clothes and wept before Me, I truly have heard you," declares the LORD.

- Contrite spirit (66:1-2) God does not look for a person who chooses one's own ways or delights in one's own abominations, but one who is humble and contrite of spirit, and who trembles at My word
- Brokenhearted (Isa 51:17; 61:1; Ps 34:18); We are to minister as Jesus to the brokenhearted, captives, and prisoners.
- The least (Matt 11:25; 18:1-4; Jas 2:5) To become the least you must be like children

Final Definition (From The Beatitudes: A Servant's Character in Christ)

"Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (Matt 5:3 KJV). When first thinking about the meaning of the poor, a lack of material goods comes to mind. Likewise, poor in spirit reflects an emptying out of oneself

for a total dependency on God. At the most fundamental level, Jesus became poor to save humankind from sin. Once people accept Him as Lord and Savior, the richness of the kingdom of heaven blesses them with an inner condition resulting from the work of God. As the opposite of a proud or haughty spirit (PBC, p. 1884), humbling oneself before God requires dependency on Him (v. 3b). A person poor in spirit impoverishes oneself to gain the riches of spiritual wealth and prosperity that comes from God's sustenance. Inward spiritual humility and a circumcised heart shape an outward impoverished state. The external display of piety from rituals does not produce an impoverished demeanor (Lev 26:41-42). Through an impoverished state believers have the kingdom of heaven, the dwelling place of the saved steeped in the richness of grace.

Greatness in leadership results from relying on God and living out His ways in their entirety for blessings of spiritual prosperity. This does not mean that the road will come easy. God will push a leader to the limits while journeying it, but won't let one's clothes wear out or feet blister. He will make a leader go hungry, only to feed the leader with the Word (Deut 8:2-7).
